

What would it be like to walk with Jesus through Holy Week—the week between Passion or Palm Sunday and his resurrection? Today, using Matthew's story of Jesus' last week, we will begin our Holy Week walk with stories of Jesus' words and actions. Although the gospels differ in the sequence of events during the last week before his crucifixion, this service provides a way to ponder a few examples of what Jesus said and did from Sunday through Wednesday before the account of his Passion begins. Join us for services on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter to continue your Holy Week walk with Jesus and experience the rest of the greatest story ever told.



Sunday Afternoon: Cleansing the Temple and return to Bethany

Then Jesus entered the temple and drove out all who were selling and buying in the temple, and he overturned the tables of the money changers and the seats of those who sold doves. ¹³ He said to them, "It is written, 'My house shall be called a house of prayer'; but you are making it a den of robbers." ¹⁴ The blind and the lame came to him in the temple, and he cured them. ¹⁵ But when the chief priests and the scribes saw the amazing things that he did, and heard1 the children crying out in the temple, "Hosanna to the Son of David," they became angry ¹⁶ and said to him, "Do you hear what these are saying?" Jesus said to them, "Yes; have you never read, 'Out of the mouths of

infants and nursing babies you have prepared praise for yourself?" ¹⁷ He left them, went out of the city to Bethany, and spent the night there.


Monday: Cursing the fig tree on the way to Jerusalem and Debating with Religious leaders in Temple

Reading Matthew 21:18-27

In the morning, when he returned to the city, he was hungry.

¹⁹ And seeing a fig tree by the side of the road, he went to it and found nothing at all on it but leaves. Then he said to it, "May no fruit ever come from you again!" And the fig tree withered at once. ²⁰ When the disciples saw it, they were amazed, saying, "How did the fig tree wither at once?" ²¹ Jesus answered them, "Truly I tell you, if you have faith and do not doubt, not only will you do what has been done to the fig tree, but even if you say to this mountain, 'Be lifted up and thrown into the sea,' it will be done. ²² Whatever you ask for in prayer with faith, you will receive." ²³ When he entered the temple, the chief priests and the elders of the people came to him as he was teaching, and said, "By what authority are you doing these things, and who gave you this authority?" ²⁴ Jesus said to them, "I will also ask you one question; if you tell me the answer, then I will also tell you by what authority I do these things. ²⁵ Did the baptism of John come from heaven, or was it of human origin?" And they argued with one another, "If we say, 'From heaven,' he will say to us, 'Why then did you not believe him?' ²⁶ But if we say, 'Of human origin,' we are afraid of the crowd; for all regard John as a prophet." ²⁷ So they answered Jesus, "We do not know." And he said to them, "Neither will I tell you by what authority I am doing these things.

Tuesday: Return to Bethany and anointing of Jesus

Reading: Matthew 26:1-13

When Jesus had finished saying all these things, he said to his disciples,

- ² "You know that after two days the Passover is coming, and the Son of Man will be handed over to be crucified."
- ³ Then the chief priests and the elders of the people gathered in the palace of the high priest, who was called Caiaphas, ⁴ and they conspired to arrest Jesus by stealth and kill him. ⁵ But they said, "Not during the festival, or there may be a riot among the people."
- ⁶ Now while Jesus was at Bethany in the house of Simon the leper, ⁷ a woman came to him with an alabaster jar of very costly ointment, and she poured it on his head as he sat at the table.
- ⁸ But when the disciples saw it, they were angry and said, "Why this waste? ⁹ For this ointment could have been sold for a large sum, and the money given to the poor."
- ¹⁰ But Jesus, aware of this, said to them, "Why do you trouble the woman? She has performed a good service for me. ¹¹ For you always have the poor with you, but you will not always have me.
- ¹² By pouring this ointment on my body she has prepared me for burial.
- ¹³ Truly I tell you, wherever this good news1 is proclaimed in the whole world, what she has done will be told in remembrance of her."

Wednesday: "Silent Wednesday"; Jesus and disciples remain in Bethany for last time of fellowship; Judas returns alone to Jerusalem to make arrangements for the betrayal.





Other prayers may be offered now.


We lift our prayers to you, O God, trusting in your steadfast love and your promise to renew your whole creation; through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.

Gathered into one by the Holy Spirit, let us pray as Jesus taught us.


Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.
